Summit Speakers

This year's speakers were Vicki Clark and Kathy Doyle.

The purpose was to give kids a great start to the new school year and included dozens of different supplies as well as note cards wishing the students a great year. 2019 United Nations' International Youth Day "The Importance of Youth Mentorship"

Anchor International commemorated International Youth Day with the opportunity to participate in an essay contest. The winning essay was written by Owen Foster-Hickey, a member of the Anchor Club of Cape Coral High School in the Florida District.

Owen was given the honor of reading his essay for all Anchors and Pilots at the Awards Breakfast. His words epitomized the theme of youth mentorship and reached everyone in an optimistic and influential way.

Youth Mentorship - Owen Foster-Hickey - Anchor Club of Cape Coral High School

"The delicate balance of mentoring someone is not creating them in your own image, but giving them the opportunity to create themselves." (Steven Spielberg). Mentorship in society is important, and can be the key to a prominent career or life. Combine the key lessons of mentorship with the impressionable minds of the world's youth and what is left can only be described as the foundation of success. A positive role model can teach a child through experience and mentorship. Youth mentorship can completely change the course of a child's life in a positive way by inspiring the minds of youth. Even teenagers can be good mentors. As Steven Spielberg said, "Mentorship gives the opportunity for someone to mold themself into the person they want to be."

Youth mentorship is a youth development strategy that can create a path to successful adulthood. Likewise, youth mentorship is extremely important in a growing society. There is an infinite amount of benefits that come from youth mentorship. Some of these benefits include better performance in school, valuable life lessons, and even greater opportunities in the community provided for the child. According to Youth.gov, "Students with mentors are 52% less likely than other students to skip a day of school and 37% less likely to skip classes." With the motivation of their mentor, these youth are also more likely to graduate high school and attend a good college. If kids get involved with their mentors, they can also learn life strategies and lessons. For example, many youth mentors teach the value of volunteering in the community and how important it is in our society today. This teaching can inspire the child to do great things by helping their community, and greaten the lives of others at the same time. One of the most important life skills any mentor can teach their child is leadership. Almost every great leader in modern history has had someone who they look up to and has inspired them to lead the way they do. Using the lessons the mentor has taught, many opportunities can now be offered to the youth, such as job opportunities and career paths. If it wasn't for the caring mentorship of Warren Buffett, Bill Gates never would have had the chance to be the CEO of a multi-billion dollar company.

What does it take to be a mentor in a growing society? It takes commitment. The mentor needs to be a positive role model who cares and has follow through. Anyone from a friend, a parent, a teacher, or even a sports player, musician, or movie star can be a positive role model and a mentor. One of the core traits a role model needs to have is good values. Research shows that children will further respect role models who practice what they preach. Often role models who support worthwhile causes, and who are willing to take steps towards their cause, help children develop and strengthen their own values. A good role model also needs confidence. For many kids, especially with the growth of electronic media devices, real life communication can be difficult. Confidence can help build up communication skills in youth by developing conversations between mentor and mentee. One of the most important skills that mentors can teach kids is respect. Respect is something that a lot of kids, and even adults lack. If mentors show kids respect and at the same time teach kids respect, the child will have a huge advantage with relationships with others. One useful life skill that mentors can emulate is creativity. Every child is born with creativity, but the use of creativity can be sparked by inspiration. If a role model shows their creativity in mentoring, then the child's imagination can truly shine. Creative options in life are limitless, which is why it benefits to role model this skill. It doesn't take a carpenter to hammer a nail, and it doesn't take an expert to be a great role model and mentor to a child. It just takes commitment, values, and creativity.

Teenagers have a special ability that they, and they alone, can use whilst mentoring. That ability is being able to connect with a child while they themselves are still a child. Many teenagers can be great role models to the youth. Organizations like Big Brother, Big Sister, and Teen Trendsetters dedicate themselves to bringing together teens with younger children and to be a mentor to them. Mentoring youth as a teenager not only benefits the child being mentored, but also teaches the teenager valuable skills. Mentoring younger kids can teach skills such as tolerability, patience, and leadership. Teenagers who mentor others can grow connected to their child, and learn a bit about what caring for a small child is like. Likewise, they will be able to step into their parent's shoes for a little while. Teens should take the opportunity if offered to mentor a child, because the child and the teen will both learn many new skills.

Youth Mentoring is a much-needed aspect in any child's life. A child's life can be positively altered by a good role model. A mentor's purpose is to grow the minds of youth and to inspire them to do great things. Teen mentoring is a great way for teens to learn valuable lessons and life skills. It allows teens to be able to connect with children and also gives children a chance to learn from the teen. If not for mentorship of youth, many a great people would not have claimed their success in life. A sorcerer needs an apprentice. Batman needs a Robin. Youth needs mentorship. "Tell me and I forget, teach me and I may remember, involve me and I learn."
